Corporate Crime and Corruption: new committee chair appointed by City of London Law Society

Eoin O'Shea has been appointed as the new Chairman of the Corporate Crime and Corruption Committee, one of the specialist committees of the City of London Law Society (CLLS).

The Committee draws on the expertise of representatives from over 25 leading City law firms and looks at a range of issues relating to criminal law as it applies to businesses.

The appointment follows the retirement of Michael Caplan QC, who was the first Chairman when the Committee was created in 2011.

Eoin O'Shea, a partner at Reed Smith, has been an active member of the Corporate Crime & Corruption Committee and is recognised as a leading expert in corporate crime and investigations.

Responding to the appointment, Eoin O'Shea said:

"On behalf of the City of London Law Society, I would like to extend my thanks to Michael for his pioneering work and leadership of the CLLS Corporate Crime and Corruption Committee from its inception. Under his stewardship the Committee grew very rapidly and became an influential contributor to policy debates on a range of legal issues.

The Committee will continue to help City firms and their clients to understand the fast-moving legal landscape and contribute positively to law-reform and the development of good practice."
