Degree or equivalent

By the time a candidate applies to qualify as a solicitor, they would need to:

 Hold a UK degree, awarded at level 6 (or above) of the Framework for Higher Education Qualifications (http://www.qaa.ac.uk/publications/information-and-quidance/publication?PublD=2718#.WGvRnNKLSM8), by a recognised degree-awarding body (https://www.gov.uk/quidance/recognised-uk-degrees)

OR

- Hold an equivalent UK qualification. A UK qualification can be considered equivalent if it is:
 - An accredited qualification at level 6 (or above) of the Framework for Higher Education Qualifications (http://www.qaa.ac.uk/publications/information-and-quidance/publication?PublD=2718#.WGvRnNKLSM8), awarded by recognised degree-awarding body or
 - ✓ A regulated qualification at level 6 (or above) of the Regulated Qualifications Framework (England, Wales and Northern Ireland) (https://www.gov.uk/find-a-regulated-qualification) or
 - ✓ An apprenticeship at level 6 or above, approved by the government departments of England, Wales or Northern Ireland <u>or</u>
 - ✓ A qualification or apprenticeship at level 9 or above (http://www.qaa.ac.uk/en/Publications/Documents/qualifications-can-cross-boundaries.pdf) of the Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework (http://www.sqa.org.uk/sqa/files_ccc/Guide_to_Scottish_Qualifications.pdf), accredited by the Scottish Qualifications Authority (SQA)

OR

- Hold an equivalent non-UK qualification. A non-UK qualification can be considered equivalent if it is:
 - ✓ Shown to be equivalent to either a UK degree or equivalent UK qualification through a UK NARIC Statement of Comparability (http://ecctis.co.uk/naric/Individuals/Compare%20Qualifications/Statement%20of%20Comparability.aspx) or
 - An accredited qualification at level 6 (or above) of the European Qualifications Framework http://www.accreditedqualifications.org.uk/european-qualifications-framework-eqf.html

OR

 Can demonstrate work experience, equivalent to a UK degree or equivalent UK qualification.
